


US Antitrust...ups and downs since 1890

Global cartels

- Continued massive impact on international cartels
 - Imprisonment of non-US nationals
 - Extradition, incarceration and cooperation
 - Cases with massive breadth and international reach
 - 2010 Today: Automotive sector
- The rise (and fall?) of class actions
 - Huge issue for cartel defendants
 - Criticism of US model
 - Is the "spectre of the US class actions" fading?
 - Influence on proposed EU legislation





US/international mergers

- Joint guidance with other competition authorities
 - US/China guidance published



- US/Canada/Mexico discussions
- New-ish merger guidelines
- International cooperation in major cases
 - UTC/Goodrich
 - Globally coordinated antitrust remedy
 - Cleared on the same day by, US, EU, Canada
 - Deutche Börse/NYSE
 - AT&T/T-Mobile



Antitrust issues

- Resale price maintenance in a post-Leegin world
 - Not a per se violation at Federal level
 - State antitrust authorities not bound by *Leegin*
 - Influence on EU approach to RPM
 - Back to the past by DoJ in Obama II?



- Google FTC
 - Patent abuse?
 - Search manipulation?
- Apple E-books DoJ
 - Agency model?
 - Wholesale model?





More antitrust issues

- What are "contracts referencing rivals" or "CRR"s?
 - Vertical contracts that include horizontal information
 - Different types including:
 - Exclusivity/Rebates
 - Most favored-nation clauses
 - Non-discrimination clauses
 - A sign of convergence on verticals enforcement with EU?



Looking to the future – DoJ/FTC

- More enforcement-minded than a Romney I administration
- Obama I track record:
 - Shelved Bush era dominance report
 - Initially slow in mergers, dominance cases, but more later in term
 - But continued tough on criminal cartel enforcement
- Obama II
 - DOJ Bill Baer nominated to head Antitrust Division
 - FTC Jon Leibowitz likely to step down in coming months
 - Continued strong cartel enforcement
 - But also possibly more dominance cases (Google, Apple) and verticals enforcement (CRRs)
